Mission Statement:

Our mission is to provide an inspirational and supportive environment that fuels and encourages artistic growth in the Visual Arts to artists interested in furthering their practice.

Overview & Benefits:

The Mendocino Art Center's Artists in Residence (AIR) Program brings both emerging and established artists from all over the country to a unique art center on the rural Northern California coast. This secluded location provides tranquility in a historic artist community rich with inspiration and local talent. In addition to providing dedicated studio space and furnished studio apartments, the program provides the freedom to develop at one's own pace in the chosen area of focus, as well as the opportunity for interaction with other disciplines. Our studios (see descriptions in Studios section) in Fine Art, Jewelry/Metal Arts, Ceramics and Fiber Arts are actively used for instruction, production, individual study and casual drop-in open studios. During your residency, the following benefits will be offered:

- Eligibility for the Lennox Scholarship Award which covers the full cost of a single apartment on campus for ONE full-term AIR (**see eligibility and requirements below**)

Definition: Artists in Residence (AIR) - Full 7 ½ month term residency

Qualifications:

- BA, BFA, MFA or proficiency in your studio practice
- A clear objective for your time in residence
- Ability to fulfill **Residency Requirements**

Residency Requirements:

- **live on campus** and pay monthly rent.
- **make a presentation** to the staff & community at the beginning of the residency.
- **open studios** to the public during scheduled AIR Open Studios and interact with interested artists and supporters.
- perform regular **volunteer** work in their studio – see individual studio descriptions for a list of projects in that studio.
- Participate in a **group exhibition** during the month of April (Full-Term AIRS only)

- **Respectfully** live and work with others and maintain standards of practice in studio and apartments

Costs:

All pricing includes 24/7 access to a dedicated studio space in your primary discipline and a fully furnished apartment on campus steps away from your studio with all utilities included.

*AIRs will also be responsible for purchase of their own materials and studio consumables.

Affordability:

While the residency requires monthly payment, we provide many ways to earn income through your work. Many residents also find part time work in the area to supplement their income.

Teaching: We encourage AIRs to gain teaching experience during their residency. Depending upon the studio, you may be able to assist workshop instructors or teach a class yourself. If you are teaching a class during your term, the Gallery Store will display your work during the month prior to your class to help promote it.

Selling your work: Monthly Open Studios. Potential opportunity to sell in the Gallery Store (by Invitation only from the Gallery Store Manager). We participate in the American Crafts Council School to Market Program and encourage our residents to present their work in a professional trade show setting.

About the Mendocino Art Center

The Mendocino Art Center, celebrating its 60th anniversary in 2019, is a non-profit arts institution on the coast of Northern California, three hours from San Francisco. With more than 150 workshops offered every year, serving close to 1,000 students, we attract both national and local instructors to our studios in Fine Art, Jewelry/Metal Arts, Fiber Arts and Ceramics. Our three galleries feature monthly exhibitions by established and emerging local artists, alongside our Gallery Store stocked with unique locally produced arts and crafts in every discipline. Studio Overview

Fiber Arts offers a multi-use studio for dyeing, screen-printing, surface design, quilting, sewing, fiber collage/assemblage/mixed media, and felting. This fully equipped studio of light has a state of the art double deep-basin stainless steel sink, and design amenities to foster a creative sanctuary environment. Past notable fiber art instructors include Jane Dunnewold, Yoshiko Wada, Jane Calendar, Jiyong Chung, Susan Louise Moyer, and Carol Soderlund.

Studio Equipment

Dyeing, screen-printing and surface design: A microwave oven, washer/dryer, sewing machines, propane burners, and electric burners, a collection of stainless pots and pans, measuring devices and vessels, large printing pads, and a digital scale.

Batik: Electric pans for heating wax, tjanting tools and brushes for wax and embroidery hoops for stretching fabric.

General: A washer and dryer, centrifugal water extractor, a 39" steamer, blender, three sewing machines, three irons and ironing boards, blow dryers, PVC pipes, wooden stamps, c-clamps, scissors, and table lifts.

Lennox Scholarship Eligibility & Requirements

- 1) Submit full Artists in Residence application
- 2) Write a 500-word essay/statement answering the following questions:
 - How will the Lennox Scholarship impact your career path as an artist?
 - Why do you think you should be awarded this scholarship?
- 3) Provide proof of financial need (copy of 2018 filed tax return and most recent paystub).
- 4) Must be a full-term Artist in Residence (7 ½ months)
- 5) Must be an Emerging Artist (Post graduate and/or beginning art career path)

- 6) Scholarship is open across all departments and art mediums.
- 7) Scholarship application is due at time of AIR application.
